Health Curriculum Statement

The Education Standards Act 2001 requires schools to consult "at least once in every two years" on the delivery of the health curriculum, and to adopt a statement on the consultation process. This consultation occurred towards the end of 2023.

All schools then need to implement the health curriculum. Individual parents, however, may request that their children be excluded from tuition of parts of the health programme related to sexuality education. Below is our draft health curriculum statement. If you have any comment to make about this statement or suggested alterations please let us know by Friday 12th April.

Mauriceville School will implement a programme of Health Education based on the New Zealand Curriculum and in keeping with the school's strategic goals and values. The focus of the programme will be to give our students the knowledge, skills and attitudes to maintain and enhance well-being. Students will recognise social and societal influences on well-being and be given opportunities to take action to promote their own and others' well-being. In delivering Health Education, Mauriceville School teachers will use a range of appropriate teaching strategies that engage students and enable development of the key competencies, while taking opportunities to integrate Health Education learning with other aspects of The New Zealand Curriculum.


The Le Quesnoy Story

After four long years of German occupation, on the 4th of November 1918 the citizens of Le Quesnoy were finally freed by New Zealand soldiers.

This liberation of the walled town by ladder was a feat so unusual it even made the New York Times.

The New Zealanders did not fire over the ramparts, preserving civilian lives within the town. While there was New Zealand loss of life fighting for the freedom of the French, not one citizen of the town died in the battle.

Last week Major Nigel Gattsche from the NZ Army came to speak to our students about his experience helping develop. The New Zealand Liberation
